MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Whitmire first recognized our firefighters following their hard work at the Mammoth Recycling fire on yesterday. The discussion with constituents was that how do things exist in our city that create hazards and health concerns. He then suggested that they continue to look for tools that would prevent this. He then thanked our first responders for their hard work and dedication. He's learned that the owner probably can't meet the cleanup obligation so he's authorized the Finance Department to find the funds to help with the cleanup.

If you haven't been to Fan Fest, he strongly recommended they go. Mexico and Czechia are playing tonight. It's quite an experience and people are still raving about the City's cooperation with the orange march that happened on Saturday. The march went through residential areas that wrapped their yards and trees in orange. He thanked the organizers and first responders. Houstonians are making this a remarkable experience. They are speaking to FIFA in hopes of attempting to get the Women's World Cup here in 2031.
